- Researched, prepared the documentation, and presented an ordinance to actively pursue expired permits.
- Implemented the E-Connect program successfully, providing: availability of Internet services related to the department, status reports of building permits, information on permit fees, and information on occupational licenses status and fees. Began offering online payments.
- Attended 150 neighborhood and civic organization meetings, a 67% increase.
- Issued approximately 1,000 occupational licenses and registrations annually.
- Eliminated illegal car sales lots through the Community Response Team's enforcement efforts. This action is particularly beneficial to nearby residents and businesses alike.

In the late 1940s, Jack Morris owned a barber shop on north Garden Avenue, and was married to Christine Morris, Clearwater's first African-American librarian.

Sidney Wigfall served the Clearwater area from 1921 – 1967 providing taxi and chauffeur services. He was listed in *Ripley's Believe It or Not* for driving 46 years without an accident or receiving a citation. Today the department issues more than 9,000 occupational licenses each year.
