

a... **Airpark.** The Clearwater Airpark's Young Eagles Program opens the eyes of enthusiasts ages 8 to 17 to the infinite possibilities of flight. In 2006, 168 Clearwater eagles experienced first flights through Chapter 282's program. A new operations building was completed on time and within budget. Additional grant dollars will be used to add a full-length porch and landscaping. 3,200 people attended the Airpark Open House in 2006, an increase of 1,200 from 2005. **Audit.** The Audit Department's revenue audits recovered \$167,000, due the city that will produce an additional \$65,000 in annual recurring revenue. Additional audits will recover

approximately \$70,000 in overdue payments.

Attorney. The Attorney's Office investigated and participated in a reimbursement program for defective bulletproof vests, saving the Police Department more than \$100,000. The Attorney's Office also expedited a gas purchase deal, saving the city more than \$10 million on gas purchases over the next 20 years. **Aging.**

The city established the Office of Aging, which is partnering with University of South Florida, Morton Plant Hospital, and University of Florida to support the initiative to develop programs for Clearwater's seniors.

Adopt. The Adopt-A-Park program has 51 opportunities to encourage community involvement. Ten facilities have already been adopted.
