BEAUTIFUL NEWS FROM BAY TO BEACH

DOWNTOWN CONSTRUCTION IS BOOMING

Construction will begin soon on several downtown projects that will redevelop key parcels, add much-needed parking, and transform Osceola Avenue. A 10-story hotel with retail space and a parking garage will be built on the former Harborview site just south of the Clearwater Main Library. A 28-story apartment building will rise on the site of the former City Hall, and a nearly 400-space parking garage will be built across Osceola Avenue, which will also receive a major makeover. These projects will bring new amenities to downtown Clearwater, which has already seen a surge in visitors and events following the \$84 million redevelopment of Coachman Park. Since reopening in 2023, The BayCare Sound has hosted more than 100 concerts and welcomed more than 336,500 attendees. These projects will beautify the area, repair underground infrastructure, and add hotel rooms, apartments, parking, and retail. We appreciate your patience during the construction.

SOLID WASTE TRANSFER STATION TEMPORARILY HOUSES RECYCLABLES

The city of Clearwater's recycling holding facility at the Clearwater Solid Waste and Recycling Center has been damaged and deemed unsafe, due to structural problems after a truck hit a concrete block support beam. The open-canopy structure is not safe for employees to use, and recycling crews are instead using a portion of the solid waste transfer station, which has been cleaned to allow for this temporary solution. The facility has two pits; one is being used for recycling and the other is holding solid waste.

Residents will not experience any changes to their normal scheduled pickup dates due to the temporary changes.

The Florida Department of Environmental Protection has approved this temporary measure, which will remain in place until the Clearwater Solid Waste recycling facility can be repaired.

WATER MAINTENANCE PROGRAM NEARS

Sept. 22 through Oct. 11, 2025

Twice a year, the city of Clearwater and Pinellas County temporarily switches its water treatment method from chloramines to chlorine. This is done to assure that water pipes stay clean, and maintain the system's integrity.

People who are sensitive to chlorine may notice a stronger smell or taste during this temporary change in our water disinfecting process. Users of kidney dialysis machines and owners of aquatic life should contact their respective service providers for additional guidance.

These simple steps may minimize chlorine odor or taste.


- Run the tap for a few minutes before using.
- Fill a pitcher of water and let it sit for several hours to allow any residual chlorine to dissipate.
- Consider installing a carbon filter on kitchen/bathroom faucets or shower heads or replacing existing filters with new ones.
